This light bending app is much more than the name suggests. With a whole series of geometric shapes and materials to choose from, you can observe how the beam refracts through the surfaces and reaches the other side, depending on the environment and index of refraction that determine the distance and the angle that the beam passes through. The program gives you tools to fully customize the whole simulation. You can choose the height, width, and length of the beam, its light output, its frequency and intensity, among other things. Bending Light

The scientific revolution began when Galileo Galilei measured the speed of a falling body by observing it pass from one location to another. In the late 19th century, physicists developed an even more powerful technique, which involves watching the light emitted by a point source, as it travels through space. In this way, it is possible to measure the speed of light and consequently the mass of the body which emitted it. The speed of light is fixed, but the mass varies. For instance, a ball of iron is much heavier than the same ball of lead. And, because light has a defined speed, it is possible to determine the mass of any body by observing the distance covered by the light as it travels. After the discovery of this principle, physicists and engineers worked to develop the systems that we use today. They used laser, fiber optics, prisms and lenses to measure distances and angles for various industrial, medical and consumer applications. The science of refraction and reflection can be divided into two broad categories:

- Refraction occurs when light bends as it passes through a medium. For example, a glass prism will refract light.
- Reflection occurs when light is reflected from a surface. In this case, the light

may change direction or simply bounce off the surface. Often, the term reflection is used to mean a change in direction, while the term refraction is used to mean that light bends as it passes through a medium. Both terms are used correctly. However, the distinction can be important when looking at the various parts of the human body. The skin is a highly reflective surface, and the breast (the chest) is both highly reflective and highly refractive. However, the eye (the back of the head) is a highly reflective surface, but is not a highly refractive surface. Lightbending.net is a smart tool designed to help you calculate how much a light beam bends through a prism. To measure this value, you must define the source, the target and the optical medium. * Setup the source, a computer display, to be the light source. * Setup the target to be the final target of the light beam. * Setup the medium, air, glass or water. After you have defined all these three parts, the application will launch the light simulation, calculate and present the angle. For demonstration purposes, we use a laser as the source, and then calculate the angle when it strikes through an air prism and a glass prism. Downloads:

What's New in the Bending Light?

· This simulation is based on Snell's law. · It's a very simple simulation. This simulation will help you: · Explain how light bends at the interface between two mediums and what determines the angle. · Apply Snell's law to a laser beam incident on the interface between mediums. · Describe how the speed and wavelength of light changes in different mediums.
