Try to be as detailed as possible. Have you tried removing it with a hammer or knife? (You can also use a soldering iron to burn off any surface codes, or a blowtorch) Is it so old that it has no hidden features? There will be more than one code for the EEPROM, but is there one code specific to the OBD/PPG/Tach codes? Most cars have a very simple OBD connector, so chances are it'll be a simple jumper wire job to remove the connector. If it's one of the newer connectors though, it's probably going to be much harder and more time consuming. If you need to get a hex editor or a gparted live cd, you should be fine once you get a flash drive. Mg2+ channel blocking agents [4-aminopyridine (4-AP), 4-aminopyridinium (4-AP+)], inhibit the activity of the renin-angiotensin-aldosterone system in the rat kidney. To determine whether these agents affect the activity of the system in the central nervous system, the effects of [4-AP and 4-AP+] on the in vitro production of the octapeptide angiotensin II (Ang II) and aldosterone in the hypothalamic/preoptic (HPO) area, pituitary gland (PITU), adrenal gland (ADR), and serum of conscious male rats, as well as on norepinephrine (NE) and dopamine (DA) in the HPO and several other brain regions, were studied. The concentration of Ang II in the HPO area was 5.8 +/- 0.6 pg/mg wet weight (n = 6) and that of aldosterone was 1.3 +/- 0.9 microgram/mg (n = 5). 4-AP (10 mg/kg) inhibited Ang II production to 4.5 +/- 0.8 (n = 4) and aldosterone to 1.1 +/- 0.3 pg/mg (n = 4)
