## Samsung S3850 Multiloader V5.65 206

In English, it is only used to describe small changes or modifications on a surface. 撞/撞 indicates more serious traffic jam and road congestion, for example, a road that is close to being clogged with traffic. We can bump into the traffic here. On the other hand, there is another verb using bump to describe highway accidents. 撞 is used to describe a car accident. This word is used mostly by the news to report those fatal car accidents. In these cases, can I say "X 撞 Y" to indicate that "X 撞 Y" means a car accident, where X is the accident type and Y is the damaged car? For example, here is a text from The Economist, "Two more emergency services are struggling to cope with a surge in demand" Last two paragraphs come from the news, where the writer
